## HOW TO BE AN ALLY FOR LGBTQ STUDENTS

▼Listen. If a student comes to talk to you about being harassed, depressed, or having parental challenges, keep in mind that you may be the only person they feel safe speaking to. ▼Respect confidentiality. Allies will respect their students' confidentiality and privacy- FERPA reminds us to do so. Assume they only told you and just want you to know, unless they indicate otherwise. ▼Be conscious of your biases. Acknowledge how homophobia, transphobia and heterosexism may affect your efforts to be an effective ally. ▼Seek out knowledge. Effective allies will periodically brush up on LGBTQ-related language, as well as current issues facing the LGBTQ community. ▼Be a resource. ## National Association of School Psychologists Position Statement

The National Association of School Psychologists (NASP) believes school psychologists are ethically obligated to ensure all youth with diverse sexual **orientations**, **gender identities**, and/or **gender expressions**, are able to develop and express their personal identities in a school climate that is safe, accepting, and respectful of all persons and free from discrimination, harassment, violence, and abuse. Specifically, NASP's ethical guidelines require school psychologists to promote fairness and justice, help to cultivate safe and welcoming school climates, and work to identify and reform both social and system-level patterns of injustice (NASP, 2010, pp. 11–12). NASP further asserts all youth are entitled to equal opportunities to participate in and benefit from affirming and supportive educational and mental health services within schools. **nasponline.org** 

## National Psychological Association Policy Statement

Whereas the American Psychological Association (APA) opposes prejudice and discrimination based on demographic characteristics including **gender identity**, therefore be it further resolved that APA supports efforts to provide safe and secure educational environments, at all levels of education, as well as foster care environments and juvenile justice programs, that promote an understanding and acceptance of self and in which all youths, including youth of all **gender identities** and **expressions**, may be free from discrimination, harassment, violence, and abuse. **apa.org**
